SUBJECT: Donnelly Park Tree Plan

Introduction:

Donnelly Park Tree Plan

Addressing two Quadrants within Donnelly Park through Parks & Recreation and Urban Forestry

Discussion:

The focus will be on Quadrants 2 and 3 within Donnelly Park.

Quadrant 2, we are requesting to have an "Extreme Risk" Laurel Oak removed and replaced with a 7-8 inch caliper Cathedral Live Oak — Funded by the MDFE. Additional 30 gallon Redbud Trees will also be installed in this specific area by the butterfly garden.

Quadrant 3, once awarded with the State Grant funds, in the fall, we will install 4 - 4" caliper Cathedral Live Oaks in this vicinity. In addition, 1 Crape Myrtle Tree by the Donnelly Building will be relocated within Donnelly Park.

Budget Impact:

No impact on the Budget.

Funds for Quadrants 2 & 3 are funded by the Mount Dora Friends of the Environment, Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and the City Tree Bank Account.

Strategic Impact:

To support;

Strategic Initiative #2 — Beautify Mount Dora. Objective 4.1 Promote Urban Forestry in Mount Dora by planting at a minimum of 50 trees per year through the end of 2030.

Strategic Initiative #2 — Beautify Mount Dora. Objective 5.1 - Complete landscape improvements to Donnelly Park by the end of FY 2025-2026 providing a "Central Park" atmosphere with special events space.

Recommendation

1. Remove and replace the Extreme Risk Laurel Oak Tree with a Cathedral Live Oak in Quadrant 2, also to install additional Redbud Trees in that specific area.
2. When State Funds are available in the fall to install 4 designated Cathedral Live Oaks in Quadrant 3, along with moving 1 Grape Myrtle to a new location in Donnelly Park

- **Safety First:** Remove the “*extreme risk*” tree near the pickleball courts and electric vehicle charging station. Replacement will be funded by the (*MDFE*) in Quadrant 2
- **Grant Funding:** Use the *FDACS Donnelly Street Tree Grant* (no match) to fund the four Cathedral Live Oak Trees in Quadrant 3
- **Community Goal:** Increase the canopy and enhance the "*Light-Up Mount Dora*" holiday display.

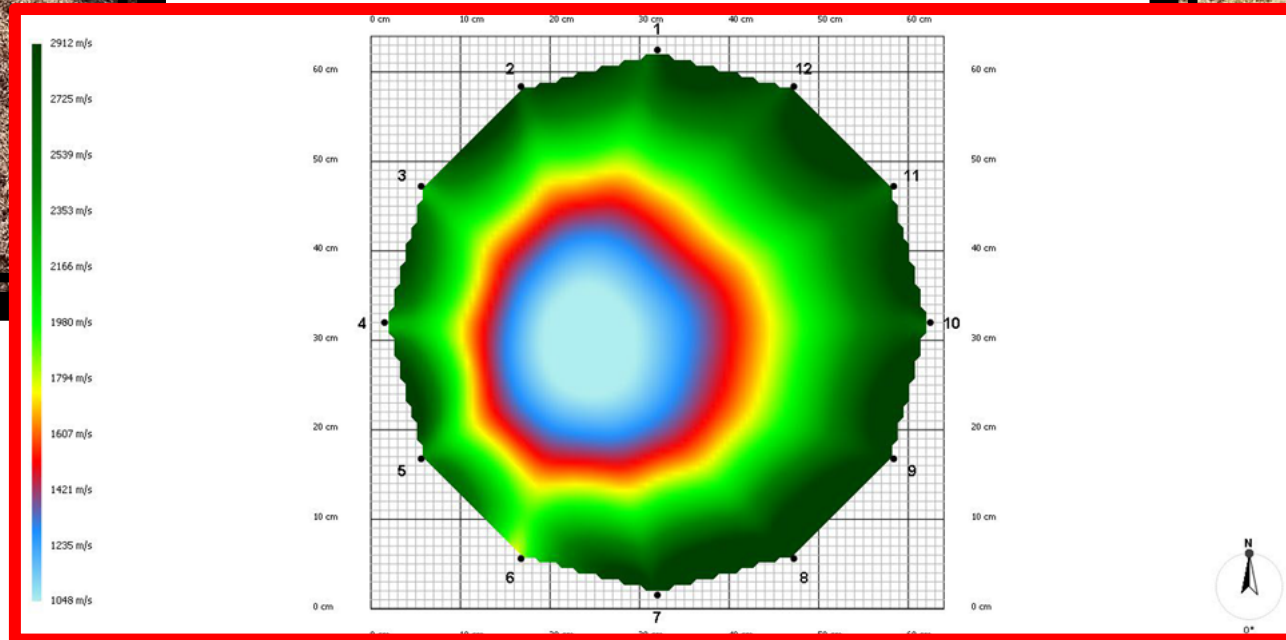

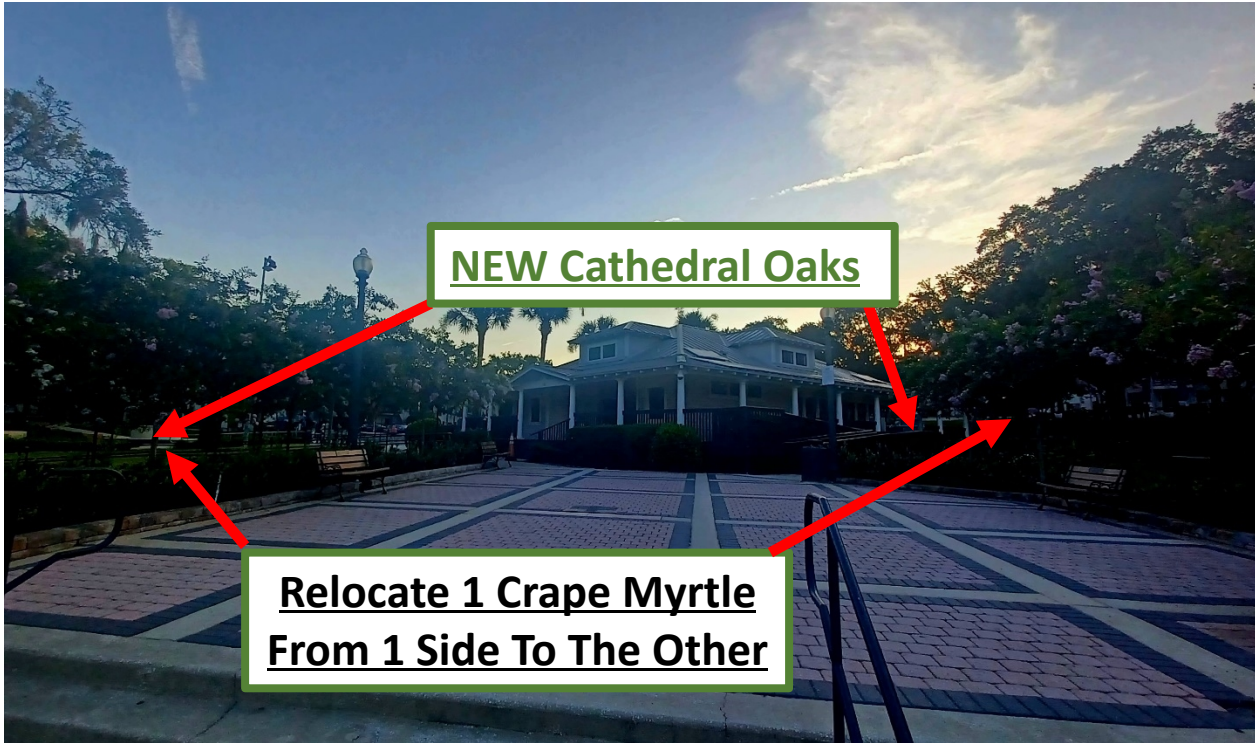

Staff update on Parks & Recreation items.

The Parks & Recreation Department is unique in both its structure and scope of responsibilities. In addition to overseeing traditional parks and recreation services, the department also manages Special Events, the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) within the downtown district, cemetery operations, building maintenance, and city facility care. With expansive operational responsibilities, the department plays an essential role in shaping the City's public spaces, facilities, community events, and overall quality of life.

The work performed by the department is a major part of what defines the character and identity of the City of Mount Dora. From maintaining parks and beautifying public spaces to supporting downtown activity, community programming, and facility operations, the department helps create the welcoming atmosphere and sense of community that make Mount Dora a special place to live, work, and visit.

Our team takes great pride in serving the community and making a positive impact every day through the services, programs, events, and spaces we provide.

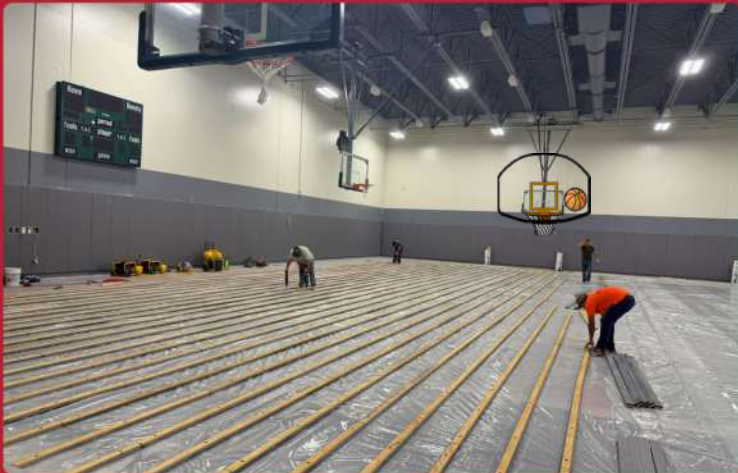

Special events continue to play an important role in the City of Mount Dora's community identity, quality of life, and economic vitality. The City's events create opportunities for residents and visitors to gather, engage, and experience the unique character of Mount Dora through civic, cultural, educational, recreational, and entertainment activities. These events help strengthen community pride while also supporting local businesses, restaurants, lodging establishments, and the downtown economy.

The Parks & Recreation Department, through its oversight of Special Events and downtown operations, continues to support and coordinate events that contribute to the City's vision of maintaining a vibrant and welcoming community atmosphere. Mount Dora's events and festivals have become a significant tourism driver, attracting visitors year-round and generating positive economic activity within the downtown district and surrounding business community.
